Meet the Faculty



Tom Bartholomew

Director

Dr. Bartholomew has been working in the field of psychiatric rehabilitation since 1988. He has worked as a caseworker in a clubhouse. He was a residential coordinator of a supportive housing agency with numerous group homes, supportive housing sites and a respite unit. He was also a program director of a partial care program. For the last twelve years, he has been on the faculty of Rutgers University and a consultant to the state of New Jersey's state psychiatric hospital leadership. Dr. Bartholomew has provided and supervised the Illness Management and Recovery (IMR) program since 2006 and conducted extensive research into the program including research as part of a National Institute of Health grant. Dr. Bartholomew has presented over 100 trainings on IMR to mental health staff. Dr. Bartholomew's current research interests include prevention of psychiatric inpatient violence, implementing clinical supervision as well as research into the effectiveness of Trauma treatments.



Ken Kinter

Faculty

Kenneth T. Kinter, Ed.D., LPC has worked with people with mental illness and addictions throughout his 30-year career. This includes 25 years working in psychiatric emergency settings, partial care programs and in a county jail. Much of this work consisted of doing intake/lethality assessments, crisis interventions, and running therapeutic groups. His current faculty appointment is comprised of two different projects: implementing evidence-based practices in psychiatric hospitals, and implementing Motivational Interviewing at several NY/NJ service providers as part of the Mental Health Technology Transfer Center (MHTTC) grant by SAMHSA. Mr. Kinter is currently completing his Ed.D. and his dissertation involves predicting and preventing 30-day readmissions to state psychiatric hospitals. He has also published on Lean Thinking / Six Sigma, deinstitutionalization, wellness centers, and Illness Management and Recovery. He and his wife also operate a therapy practice in Bordentown, New Jersey. In his spare time, he plays bass, sleeps, and spoils numerous animals.

Jennifer Sperduto, MS, is a Lecturer in the Department of Psychiatric Rehabilitation and Counseling Professions at Rutgers University. She has over 25 years experience in the mental health field in a variety of academic and community settings, including a Clubhouse model psychiatric rehabilitation program, a vocational rehabilitation program, and community housing programs. Her current role is to provide technical assistance, consultation, and training to state psychiatric hospitals. Ms. Sperduto has participated in both quantitative and qualitative studies related to the effectiveness of inpatient treatment interventions and has been involved in several evaluation projects which examine the implementation and fidelity of Evidence Based Practices, including Illness Management & Recovery and Violence Reduction in a state hospital setting. She has developed curricula for recovery-oriented programming to improve discharge readiness and facilitate community re-integration for persons served in the state hospital system.

Group Facilitation Basics

You will learn how to run groups effectively, use manuals, and understand the different types of groups that can support clients. The course covers techniques such as balancing discussion topics and group interactions, creating a positive atmosphere, and addressing common issues that may arise in group settings.

Safewards Training

This course will introduce you to Safewards as a multidimensional model for reducing violence in a hospital setting. Safewards is a program that encourages staff and patients to work together to make the hospitals safer for everyone. Safer means a calmer and more positive place. Safewards uses 10 simple strategies that staff and patients can use to decrease conflict.

Trauma-Informed Microskills: Establishing Safety

This innovative training explores the Autonomic Nervous System through storytelling, humor, and evidence-based insights. Viewers are guided through engaging scenarios that vividly demonstrate key physiological concepts and therapeutic applications. Participants learn how stress and trauma affect the body and gain practical tools for self-regulation, establishing safety, and co-regulation.

Practical Facts about Mental Illness

This course will provide an overview of mental illness, its causes, treatment, and common symptoms exhibited by people in inpatient psychiatric hospitals -- important concepts foundational to working with individuals recovering from mental health conditions. We will look at the practical facts about mental illness and identify ways in which we can support individuals through their recovery journey.

Three Steps to Safety

This course introduces you to an evidenced informed approach to violence prevention called Three Steps to Safety. Students will learn the primary driver of reactive violence and how to build a therapeutic "Bank Account" with their clients. An implementation manual is included to aid in staff training as are demonstration videos detailing the use of the Three Steps. This program is currently in use in hospitals in NJ, MA, VA and WA states.

Tools for Moving On

This course will provide an overview of Tools for Moving On (TFMO), a group curriculum for use in inpatient psychiatric settings to prepare patients for transition to community living and more successful discharges. 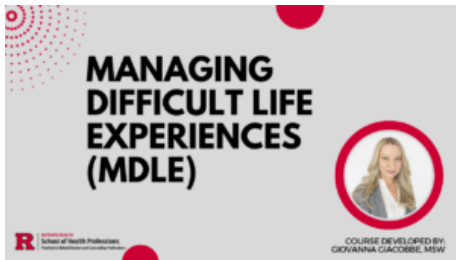
Continuing Education Courses



Self-Management and Recovery Training (SMART)

The purpose of this training is to teach you about SMART Recovery so you can facilitate more effective addictions groups. This training should take you approximately 60 minutes and contains exercises, video clips, and knowledge assessments.

Managing Difficult Life Experiences (MDLE)

This course introduces Managing Difficult Life Experiences (MDLE), a manualized, trauma-focused group program that supports early trauma recovery by establishing safety and developing coping skills. Participants learn trauma-informed psychoeducation, grounding, and self-regulation to manage emotions, triggers, and overwhelming experiences in a structured group setting.

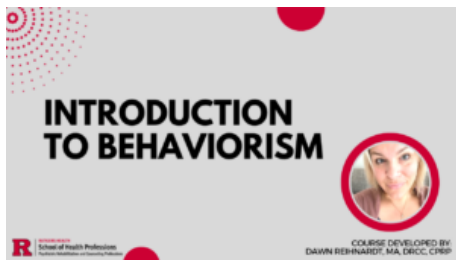

Trauma-Informed Universal Precautions

This course will introduce you to 5 Universal Precautions for staff to use when interacting with patients to prevent trauma and re-traumatization when interacting with patients. These precautions aim to foster a Trauma-Informed Culture through promoting communication, safety, collaboration, mutual respect, and healing.

Introduction to Behaviorism

This course provides an introduction to the science of behaviorism including behavioral strategies and interventions used to address problematic behaviors in an inpatient setting. The focus is on learning how staff can inadvertently reinforce non-adaptive patient behaviors. Learners will understand the role of operant conditioning, reinforcement, and extinction in shaping healthy behaviors in both colleagues and clients.

Social Skills Training

The purpose of this training is to teach you to utilize Social Skills Training for Schizophrenia (Bellack et al., 2004) and the Social Skills Group Manual (Kinter & Sperduto, 2025) to facilitate more effective social skills groups. This training should take you approximately 60 minutes and contains exercises, video clips, and knowledge assessments.

Recovery & Wellness

This course will provide an overview of Recovery and Wellness -- two important concepts foundational to working with individuals recovering from mental health conditions. Just as every individual is unique, the supports that help people recover and maintain their overall psychiatric and general health should also be person-centered and individualized to the person in recovery. This course will explore the basics of Recovery and Wellness and identify ways in which we can support individuals through their recovery journey.

OARS: Strategies for Effective Communication

This course will introduce you to the therapeutic communication techniques known as OARS. OARS represents communication strategies that can help a practitioner engage in therapeutic communication in a variety of ways: group settings, individual interactions, and are useful tools for de-escalation.

[Introduction to Inpatient Treatment Malls](#)

This 2-part series introduces the viewer to Inpatient Psychiatric Treatment Malls: what they are, what they do, and how and why to develop them at your facility and how to measure and improve fidelity in Inpatient Treatment Malls using the Inpatient Treatment Mall Scale (ITMS). [Introduction to Polydipsia for Mental Health Professionals](#)

Polydipsia is a common yet potentially dangerous condition for individuals with mental illness, often overlooked by mental health professionals. This 17-minute educational video by Ken Kinter, Ed.D., and Tom Bartholomew, Ph.D., aims to inform professionals about polydipsia, its causes, and possible treatments.

[The Relationship Between Genetics, Epigenetics, Trauma, and Brain Development](#)

This 15-minute video, presented by Ken Kinter, explores the interplay between genetics, epigenetics, and the environment in human brain development. It highlights how trauma impacts development biologically and environmentally, emphasizing the need for trauma treatment in mental health and addiction care.

[Suicide Among America's Veterans](#)

This 15-minute video compares the suicide rates between America's military and general populations, discusses various risk factors and warning signs for suicide, and provides guidance and resources for veterans struggling with suicide and their loved ones. [Trauma-Informed Universal Precautions](#)

Key principles of Trauma-Informed Care (TIC) include safety, trustworthiness, transparency, cultural sensitivity, collaboration, and empowerment among staff and patients. Implementing TIC requires leadership support, commitment, ongoing learning, and a shift in attitudes. Leaders should foster a TIC culture by addressing trauma-related challenges, especially in the context of crises like COVID-19, and focusing on five core areas: Consider impacts of widespread crises, Utilize therapeutic communication, Avoid judgments, Create a healing environment, and Practice Self-Care

[Fundamentals of Providing Inclusive Care to Transgender and Gender Diverse Patients](#)

Research shows that transgender and gender diverse people in the United States have higher rates of mental health issues including suicidality, depression, anxiety and substance use than the general population. This webinar aims to provide attendees with the introductory knowledge and skills necessary to begin providing affirming care to transgender and gender diverse individuals. [Readmission at State Psychiatric Hospitals](#)

This 15-minute video discusses various aspects of readmissions, particularly 30-day readmissions to state psychiatric hospitals. It also details how readmissions have been studied and current research work in this area. Created and Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Group Facilitation Skills](#)

This 4-part series on Group Facilitation includes the functions and types of groups, preparing for groups, group dynamics, stages of group and associated tasks, group focus, and various tools for dealing with problem situations and timing issues. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Social Skills Group Training](#)

This 20-minute video is intended to help the viewer to run better social skills groups by using Social Skills Training for Schizophrenia, 3rd edition (Mueser et al., 2024) as well as the Rutgers' Facilitator's Guide. It describes the why and how of social skills groups (see our video - Group Facilitation Part 3 for more about this) and describes the content in the new edition of the textbook. [Introduction to Cognitive Behavioral Therapy \(CBT\)](#)

This 28-minute video introduces cognitive-behavioral techniques and differentiates techniques from cognitive-behavioral therapy. It details the relationship between thoughts, feelings, and behavior and reviews several common cognitive distortions. It also discusses the utility of cognitive-behavioral techniques with people with severe and persistent mental illness. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[A Primer in Clinical Supervision](#)

This 27-minute video will cover a bit of the history of clinical supervision, the three functions of clinical supervision and the difference between administrative and clinical supervision. Presented by Dr. Tom Bartholomew

[Best Practices in Clinical Supervision](#)

This 3-part series discusses the potential effectiveness of psychosocial programs if done to fidelity and covers the restorative function of clinical supervision with examples of how to achieve this function. The normative and formative functions of Clinical Supervision, along with implementation theory, are also reviewed. Presented by Dr. Tom Bartholomew.

[Best Practices in Restorative Supervision](#)

This 40-minute presentation describes the best practices in restorative supervision. The term "restorative supervision" comes from the three functions of clinical supervision from the Alliance or Proctor Model, namely restorative, formative and normative functions. Presented by Dr. Tom Bartholomew.

[DSM-5](#)

This 28-minute video serves as an introduction/review of the DSM-5 as well as explaining how diagnosis works and how the DSM-5 differs from the DSM IV TR. Special attention is paid to diagnoses frequently seen in state psychiatric hospitals. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Diagnosis and the DSM](#)

This 55-minute video provides an overview of the DSM 5 TR, while also discussing other topics pertinent to diagnosis, such as stigma, challenges in the diagnostic process, the underreporting of trauma, and PTSD, and the use of diagnosis as a clinical tool, for reimbursement, and as an educational tool. [Introduction to Trauma-Informed Care](#)

This 17-minute video discusses the basics of trauma-informed care, particularly in working with people with severe and persistent mental illness in a hospital setting. Triggers and ways to mitigate them are also discussed. This video can be used to set up the 3 Steps to Safety video. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Gender Identity: Working with Gender Diverse Individuals](#)

This 64-minute video reviews key terms to ground the discussion on gender and gender identity and highlights health disparities that impact the lives of gender diverse individuals. It also applies the Minority Stress Model to working with gender diverse individuals and explores different strategies to promote effective behavioral healthcare services. Resources for non-binary individuals are also included. Presented by Anthony Zazzarino.

[SMART Recovery](#)

This 20-minute video provides an overview of SMART Recovery. It reviews the origin, components, worksheets, as well as a comparison between it and the traditional 12-step approach to addiction recovery. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Addictions](#)

This 32-minute video provides a clinical overview of addiction. The diagnoses, criteria, and types of addiction are reviewed, as is comorbidity with Mental Illness and the influence of heredity and trauma. Basics of treatment options are also discussed and additional resources are suggested. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Process Addictions](#)

This 25-minute video describes and details the differences between Substance Use Disorders and Process Addictions. Several Process Addictions are discussed, as well as their implications for treatment. It illustrates the relationship between Addictions, Mental Illness, and Trauma and the concept of cross addiction is explored. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Introduction to/Review of Sex Addiction](#)

This 23 minute video covers sex addiction from self-diagnosis to treatment options. Myths and facts about sex addiction are differentiated and resources are given for additional learning. Created and presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Helping vs. Enabling: How to Best Help Your Loved One](#)

This 28-minute video is a presentation developed for Intensive Family Support Services. It is intended for families who have a loved one with severe and persistent mental illness and/or addictions who feel trapped and have questions about when helping becomes enabling. It describes challenges to independence for their loved one as well as strategies to overcome these challenges. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Compassion](#)

This 20-minute video discusses empathy, compassion, self-compassion, and factors that increase and decrease our compassion. It focuses on implications for healthcare workers and those in the helping professions, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic. It provides tips and tools for increasing compassion toward the self and others. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Burnout, Compassion Fatigue, & Grief](#)

This 24-minute introductory video describes and differentiates between burnout, compassion fatigue, and different types of grief. Causes, symptoms, and many suggestions for coping with these are discussed. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Introduction to Crisis Intervention](#)

This 18-minute introductory video describes what a crisis is and how to intervene and help prevent them. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Introduction to Critical Incident Debriefing](#)

This 13-minute video reviews the process of debriefing critical incidents and provides a template for people responding to them. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Guardianships in the Mental Health Arena](#)

Court-appointed legal guardians make decisions on personal and medical care, meals, transportation, and living arrangements for incapacitated individuals. They also manage assets, budgets, debts, and financial decisions. The government ensures guardians understand their significant authority and responsibility. Presented by Nicole Williams-Parks and Caroline Gargione.

[Dynamic Assessment of Situational Aggression \(DASA\)](#)

This 11-minute video was designed to assist trainers in introducing the Dynamic Assessment of Situational Aggression, or DASA, to hospital staff. It familiarizes the viewer with the form, the process, and the criteria for the assessment. Presented by Ken Kinter.

[Three Steps to Safety](#)

This is a 10-minute video is designed to assist people training in 3 Steps to Safety in a hospital setting. It provides a basic introduction to different types of violence in inpatient settings. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Suicide: Facts, Approaches, and Interventions](#)

This 25-minute video relates various statistics about suicide, discusses the importance and ways to discuss suicide with people in a professional setting, and provides resources for additional information about suicide and suicide assessment. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

[Medications for Opioid Use Disorder](#)

This 2-part series, presented by Drs. Clement Chen and Erin Zerbo, discusses Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and the challenges of prescribing. OUD poses significant public health issues, increasing morbidity and mortality. Patients with chronic mental illnesses are more vulnerable to psychiatric decompensation due to opioid use, but Buprenorphine can help prevent relapse and aid recovery.

[Using Violence Risk Assessments for Court](#)

The NJ state hospital system uses a violence risk assessment method to prepare patients for court hearings. Psychologists and psychiatrists create assessments, which are reviewed by the Special Status Patient Review Committee (SSPRC) to support patient recovery. A standardized review method for these assessments will be discussed by Michele Galietta, PhD, and Richard Jackson, MD.

[Introduction/Review of Personality Disorders](#)

This 27-minute video informs the viewer about the diagnostic criteria for personality disorders and challenges in treating them. Special attention is paid to Borderline, Antisocial, and Narcissistic Personality Disorders and their impact in inpatient settings. The impact of people with personality disorders outside of psychiatric settings is also discussed. Presented by Ken Kinter, Ed.D.

The Bleyzer Program is an innovative initiative designed to support patients transitioning from long-term inpatient psychiatric care to successful independent living. This structured program simulates a real-world, independent living environment where participants build essential coping strategies, daily living skills, and self-management techniques crucial for maintaining stability in the community. Webinar participants will learn how the program was developed, key components of its curriculum, and evidence-based strategies that have contributed to its success. Presented by: Tyson Keller.

Attention Shaping to Improve Functioning

February 2026

This presentation reviews environmental and behavior modification strategies to improve functioning in individuals with chronic schizophrenia who have not benefited from traditional psychiatric rehabilitation interventions. The session will focus on the method of attention shaping (a manualized intervention), along with evidence from case studies and randomized controlled trials supporting its effectiveness. Dating and Romance: Supporting this Human Desire in the People You Serve

December 2025

In this engaging session, Emily Grossman shares her personal journey of navigating romance while living with and recovering from a serious mental health condition. [Polydipsia in Mental Health Settings](#)

November 2025

Polydipsia—excessive fluid intake—is a common but often overlooked concern in inpatient psychiatric settings. Participants will also learn about the implementation of this intervention within a high-security forensic inpatient hospital in Missouri, and the effectiveness of the program following its inception in 1987. Trauma and Psychosis

Methods for reliably screening and diagnosing PTSD in people with SMI will be described, as well as strategies for distinguishing between psychotic symptoms and PTSD symptoms. The remainder of the presentation will describe a 12-16 week standardized cognitive behavioral intervention for treating PTSD in people with SMI, the Cognitive Restructuring (CR) program, which has been shown to be effective in controlled studies. Social Skills Training for Long-Term Psychiatric Inpatients

The training will begin with a brief rationale for the importance of social skills training (SST) as a rehabilitation approach for improving social and community functioning in people with schizophrenia and other serious mental illnesses. This will be followed by a brief history of SST and its current status as an evidence-based practice. Next, the basic logistics and teaching methods of SST will be reviewed, including the selection of skills curricula taught. The remainder of the presentation will focus on providing SST in long-term inpatient settings, including logistical considerations for running SST groups, social skills curricula, and strategies for maximizing the generalization of skills from the group to patients' daily lives, including on the ward and in the community.
